Inspections!

This term we have seen all our original six Trust schools going through the Section 5 Ofsted Inspection process, except of course Landscove which remains outstanding. While it is always a bit of a worry being scrutinised by an external body and especially as four of the five schools had an HMI leading the process, it was very positive for all our schools as they all retained their 'Good' judgement and from the Inspection Reports you can see that the vast majority had only minor issues to address. Across the board Safeguarding was commented on very positively, as our attention to detail in terms of safeguarding has developed and improved. We now have robust systems of checking and keeping children safe, while staff knowledge, understanding and vigilance has deepened enormously. I am very proud of this as it should be at the core of all we do. This has been judged to be the case.

Alongside safeguarding was our inclusive approach to all families. The fact that children love learning in our schools and your very strong supportive messages ensured that every school was commended on the positivity of children's learning behaviours and their resilience and independence as learners. This is so important as it will ensure our children are ready for whatever life throws at them in the future. Similarly, the delivery of a broad and balanced curriculum, with our children having all the advantages of an experiential learning approach was clear in most of the reports, sometimes while acknowledged on the day, it was not included in the final letter to the Academy Head. Our Five Star Pledge supported the fact that we expect to give our children the very best experiences and this has led to an exciting and fun approach to teaching and learning. There were many more positive and exemplary practices identified in each school as they continue to retain their uniqueness- please read our great Ofsted Inspection Reports- remember that we only had one day to 'show off' and so anything Inspectors felt was positive they did not focus on and as a result many of our Early Years classes did not even get a visit; their brilliant practice was clear from the outset!

As always there are areas we need to work on and we initiated that after the very first visit! Our School Improvement priorities for 2019-20 are being mapped out in order to continue the improvement as this year's objectives are achieved. It is very satisfying though to know that our judgement of great practice in all our schools is fully endorsed by Ofsted. The SIAMS Inspection of Harbertonford was also a resounding success with a soundly good judgement and a very positive report, which shows that we have commendable practice in place and simply need to embed our approach a little more. A huge well done to everyone at Harbertonford. In all of these inspections our local governors have a very important role in learning from the schools, supporting their actions and challenging the Academy Head; clearly they have done a superb job for which I would like to say a tremendous 'thank you'. This is a voluntary role which holds a great deal of responsibility, commitment and dedication. While our Local Boards are all slightly different in the level of experience they show, they have all done a marvellous job of supporting our schools effectively and with enthusiasm- thank you, you make a real difference to the effectiveness of our schools.



Partnership Working

On January 1st we started working in partnership with the two schools of the Raleigh Federation, Drakes Primary in East Budleigh and Otterton Primary. They are two small schools with less than 100 pupils on roll each and have been working together for a number of years. Their Headteacher retired and they needed support, so we have stepped in.

Peter Halford has been seconded into the Executive Headteacher role at Raleigh, while Alex Waterman has been leading Yeoford for the period. We anticipate the schools will be joining the Link in the future, but need to go through various processes to ensure this is the best decision for everyone.

Broadhempston Primary have also joined the Link, initially in a Management Partnership from the beginning of March while we complete the process of them becoming an Academy and joining the Trust later in the year.

This is really exciting, working with the three schools this term has brought loads of benefits and a few challenges. Overall it is really positive to see how the reputation of the Link Academy is growing and is exactly what we wanted- a specialist Multi Academy Trust with an expertise in small schools and the ability to work together to provide a cutting-edge education in our local village communities.

Recognition by the DfE

We have also been involved with the DfE as part of their research into running rural primary schools efficiently- three of our financial processes/ practices were case studied their recently publication. Give Back Day

This year we have had a focus on improving the work/life balance of our staff, however, we soon realised that we really need everyone to continue to 'go the extra mile'. Sarah Luxton at Bearnes - I am using my give back day to compete in The World Pilot Gig Championships being held on the Isles of Scilly. I have competed in the event for many years with great success, last year coming 10th overall. This has also on occasion put my place in the A crew in jeopardy. Fortunately, so far I have managed to arrive on every occasion.

However, this year because I have a 'give back day' I have been able to fly out with my crew members at the same time as them, which not only means I am part of the team spirit I am able to relax and focus on my racing and competition rather than the perpetual worry of will I get there on time, which will hopefully translate into an even better performance! Stoke Gabriel Primary School



They both have outdoor classroom spaces and fire-pits so they are able to go up to the allotments in all weather! Since Christmas the children have had visits from Birds of Prey as well as visits to Living Coasts as part of the Conservation topic looking at how wildlife is being effected by the amount of plastic in the ocean.

Both schools are part of Exmouth Learning Community and have been taking part in netball, hockey and football tournaments with tag rugby and athletics coming up in the next few weeks.

The Parents have had an opportunity to share their views in the school in Parents Forums this term and have suggested marketing the schools to ensure we have a higher profile in the local community and beyond. They would also like a Toddler group to attract more numbers of pupils into the schools.
